

For centuries animals have gone to war involuntarily, and our Civil War was no exception. A countless number of four-legged and winged creatures served as soldiers' and sailors' pets, sharing the hardships of military life on land and sea. A few gained national prominence as regimental mascots, the most famous being Old Abe, the bald eagle which campaigned with the 8th Wisconsin Infantry. Pets provided a valuable service in relieving homesickness and other

the most common but cats found favor within the Union and Confederate navies for their role in combating the hordes of rats and mice which infested ships. Of course, the essential resource for cavalry, artillery, and transportation units as well as

for officers' mounts was an estimated more-than-two million horses and mules. But tales of such other creatures as squirrels, raccoons, bears, and even a camel are found within this book.

Some accounts are humorous, but others are tragic. The stories of these animal heroes were drawn largely from memoirs, regimental histories, and Civil War letters. They offer insight into a little studied aspect of this very uncivil war's history and should be of interest not only to students of that conflict but to animal lovers as well.



The first book about Jennie Wade's beau, Jack Skelly. At the age of 20, Jack Skelly, a Gettysburg civilian, said to his mother, "My country needs me, Mother. May I go?" He left his home to volunteer in the Union army from April of 1861 until June 1863. He initially served in the 2nd Pennsylvania Infantry before joining the 87th Pa. Infantry—the unit he was serving with when he was mortally wounded on June 15, 1863, at the Battle

of Second Winchester (also known as Carter's Grove and Stephenson's Depot). Skelly died July 12, 1863, in a Confederate hospital while a prisoner of war. His confidant, Jennie Wade, was the only civilian fatality during the Battle of Gettysburg, dying nine days earlier.

The story of Jack Skelly and the Skelly family includes 17 letters written between Jack and his mother Elizabeth during the Civil War years. The book also discusses the relationship between Jack and Jennie Wade, and contains five previously unpublished letters from Jennie to Jack--a total of six. Also included are letters of Jack's brother, Charles, who also served in the 87th Pennsylvania and his father Johnston Skelly Sr., who served in the 101st Pennsylvania Infantry. The book contains a total of 36 letters, revealing social situations and life in war-time Gettysburg, and what it was like for the Gettysburg citizens turned soldiers in the field.

In many respects, Foster's letters mirror the comments made by soldiers on both sides. However, there is another dimension to Foster's letters that is much less common in Civil War correspondence—the intimate exchange of the couple's views on sex-expressions that certainly challenge the broad assumption that "Victorians" did not speak of these matters. Another important dimension is that he had an especially keen eye for detail, reflected in occasional drawings, and a talent for colorful language. At his best, Foster's comments about the war as seen from a soldier in the field rival anything that has been published. Indexed, 53 illustrations and photos.




